

## KS4 Art & Design - Starting Point



The learner will use a sound piece by artist collective SHELL LIKE (created to accompany sculptures by Liverpool Biennial 2021 artist, Alice Channer) as inspiration to create their own artwork.

Estimated time = 1 hour

#### **Gurriculum Extract:**

Subject aims and learning outcomes

### Key Terms:

- **Audio** Sound, especially when recorded, transmitted, or reproduced.
- Sound art Art which uses sound both as its medium (what it is made out of) and as its subject (what it is about). Read more about sound art here: https://www.tate.org.uk/art/art-terms/s/sound-art
- **Commission** In art, a commission is the act of requesting the creation of a piece, often on behalf of another. Artwork may be commissioned by private individuals, by galleries or art institutions, by the government, or businesses.

### LB2021 Project:

For Liverpool Biennial 2021, artist collective SHELL LIKE has created the audio work *FIRST BIRTH* which has been designed to accompany the artworks of artist Alice Channer at the Lewis's Building.

SHELL LIKE creates a dedicated space for sound art and focuses on the importance of listening - particularly as a group - as an important social and political act. Led by writers Amy Lay-Pettifer and Fer Boyd, SHELL LIKE has developed over three years to encompass deep listening events, commissioning and producing, experiments in exhibition and event formats, and co-authored experimental writing and sound works.

### **Activity Instructions:**

Use SHELL LIKE's sound piece/text as a starting point to create a piece of work. This sound piece is an artwork in itself, so just like you would take inspiration from a painting or an artwork that you can see, you can take inspiration from an artwork that you can hear.

Choose how you would like to respond to this piece. It could be through painting, drawing, installation, moving image, sculpture, photography, textiles, print – you can choose!

You can access this artwork by listening to the sound piece, or through reading the text version underneath. You can use the whole piece as inspiration, using the atmosphere it creates to inspire you, or take a small section, or even a single sentence or phrase that stands out to you, to begin your own artwork.

Each person will take away something different, which means that each piece of work that is created in response will be different. The work focuses on the act of listening. As you listen, your individual interpretation of this work this will lead you to create an artistic response that is personal to you.


Think about the following questions to help you unpack this artwork, to be able to use it for your own creative inspiration:

- How does it make you feel?
- What imagery does it conjure up in your mind?
- Who do you think is narrating this sound piece?
- Where does this sound piece take you? Can you visualise the place that the narrator is talking about?

### **Materials:**

Any materials that you like!
Experiment with different media to see the effect that it has on your work.



- 1. Listen once through following the 'physical instructions for remote listening' outlined below the sound piece online. When you listen again, close your eyes and hold a pen or pencil in your hand. Take the pen for a walk and as the sound piece takes you on your journey, create different shapes according to how you feel.
  - o Do you feel calm? Your lines may be rounded and soft.
  - o Do you feel anxious? Your lines may be jagged and sharp.
  - Do you feel lost? Your lines may spiral aimlessly across the page.
- 2. Draw an image of what or who you think is talking.
- 3. Write down 10 words which jump out to you. These words could be words that you are unfamiliar with or words which interest you in some way. Use these as starting points for creating artwork.
